Palo Alto High School, Paly, has long had a national reputation for academic excellence. The proximity of Stanford University, the Silicon Valley business community, and San Francisco has created a socially diverse community with high academic expectations and a strong belief in quality public education. The student body reflects the community's socio-economic status and educational level. The ethnic/racial makeup of our student population is 37.2% Asian, 2.8% African-American/Black, 45.7% Caucasian, 11.7% Hispanic/Latino, 1.3% Filipino, 0.6% American Indian/Alaskan Native, 0.7% Pacific Islander. 10% of the student population is enrolled in Free/Reduced Lunch Program; 8.7% are first generation college students. Total student enrollment is 2,125.

Palo Alto High School's Guidance Program provides academic planning, personal counseling, and college and career advising for students. At the core of the guidance department is the Teacher Advisor (TA) Program. The primary delivery of guidance materials and instruction is via the teacher advisors in the Thursday advisory periods. The teacher advisors serve as students' academic advisors and write students' counselor recommendations and/or school reports.

ACADEMICS 2018-2019

Paly students benefit from a rich curriculum and extensive extra-curricular opportunities. The student-teacher ratio is 28:1. Students may enroll in up to seven classes a semester. Students must take a minimum of five classes. Juniors and seniors must take a minimum of five classes. Students earn 5 credits for passing each semester course. Specialty Programs

Social Justice Pathway – A three-year program featuring self-direction and project-based learning in an interdisciplinary model rooted in community action and collaboration. Students begin by learning the practices of social justice in sophomore year by identifying global local issues that they want to devote themselves to, and learn how to achieve transformative rather than temporary relief from social problems. <http://palsjp.com>

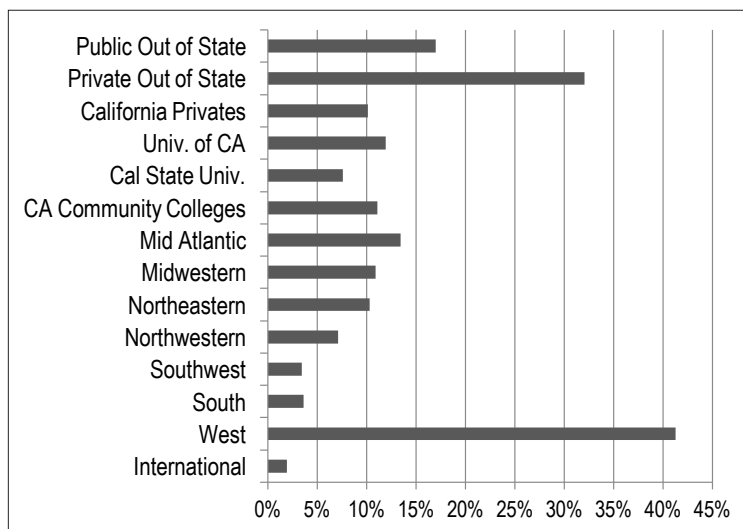

ADVANCED PROGRAMS

Classes marked “H” or “A” are part of a special sequence of courses (enriched or accelerated) with high academic standards leading to an Advanced Placement “AP” courses at college level. The recommendations made to students in AP courses are based on a rigorous set of standards. These courses provide intellectual challenge beyond that of regular college preparatory courses. Therefore, the school hopes that the college admissions office will consider the nature and quality of the work, as well as the grades, in assessing this record.

Grade Point Averages on Transcript
